Preamble

The main focus of our collecting is the province of British Columbia. We are interested in exploration and travel, frontier and pioneer life, history, business, labour, literature and the arts, politics, and the different peoples who populate B.C. We also collect non-B.C. material in existing areas of strength including Canadian history, English literature, children's literature, maps and cartography, music, history of science and medicine, Chinese history and literature (in Chinese), and fly fishing. The following guidelines and appendixes can be used to better understand the collecting aims of Rare Books and Special Collections.

I. General Guideline for collecting printed material:

Where this guideline uses the words 'book' or 'books' it means printed materials including books, pamphlets, serials, broadsides, etc. At the discretion of the Rare Books and Special Collections Librarian or designate(s), materials may be placed in Rare Books and Special Collections when they fall into the categories listed below. This guideline does not in itself reflect an order of priority, our priorities are set out above in general terms and in the Descriptions of Major Printed Collections.

1. Early imprints and Canadian books:
 - a. Books printed before 1750
 - b. Books printed in the Americas before 1800
 - c. Books printed in Canada in the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec and Ontario before 1867
 - d. Books printed in the three prairie provinces and the then Northwest Territories before 1960
 - e. Books printed in British Columbia and the Yukon
 - f. Books printed in Newfoundland before 1949
2. Rare or irreplaceable books:
 - a. Significant limited editions
 - b. Significant association copies or autographed books

- c. Important first editions
 - d. Books with added manuscript or other material of significance
 - e. Rare or ephemeral Canadiana
3. Books of aesthetic importance, including:
- a. Fine printing
 - b. Fine binding
 - c. Folio or plate books
 - d. Fine illustrations
 - e. Rare maps
 - f. Books produced by presses notable in the history of printing, e.g. Jenson, Plantin, Bodoni, Bulmer, Doves
4. Books which by their nature may be subject to loss or damage:
- a. Books of high value, i.e. over \$400 (in 2004 dollars)
 - b. Erotica
 - c. Curiosa
 - d. Esoterica
5. Rare or special non-book material:
- a. Manuscripts in the collecting areas of RBSC (See page 36) except those normally collected by The University Archives
 - b. Photographs and audio-visual materials of literary or historical interest
 - c. Pamphlets, broadsides, posters, prints
 - d. Rare newspapers and journals
 - e. Rare and/or important maps, charts, globes, bookplates, architectural plans and engineering drawings
 - f. Realia, stamps, coins and trade tokens
 - h. Implements and machines of the printing and binding trades
6. Special Collections: material that is of sufficient importance to the arts and sciences in Canada, as a collection, that it should be held together even though some items may be neither rare nor valuable.

Wallace E. Chung and Madeline H. Chung Collection

Born in Victoria BC, Wallace Chung attended Victoria College, the University of British Columbia and McGill University and was among the early Chinese Canadians to embark on a professional career. In 1953 he married Dr. Madeline Chung (née Huang). Dr. Wallace Chung specialized in vascular surgery and was the first Chinese-Canadian to head a department of surgery in Canada. When he retired from the University of British Columbia in 1991 he had served as Professor of Surgery and Head of the Department of Surgery at the UBC Hospital. Dr. Madeline Chung was born in Shanghai, China, and grew up in Hong Kong. She came to Canada in 1949 and specialized in obstetrics. Both have been very active in community service in Vancouver.

Dr. Wallace Chung assembled an extensive research collection of more than 25,000 items on the exploration of the Pacific Northwest, the Chinese experience in North America and British Columbia, and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company including its trans-Pacific and coastwise shipping lines. Dr. Chung is an expert collector and includes manuscript material and realia as well as the expected printed material in his collecting lexicon. A small portion of the collection is exhibited in the Chung Room in the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre.

Doukhobor Collection

The UBC Library collection was started in the 1950's when Professor Harry B. Hawthorn and others participated in the Doukhobor Research Committee. In the early 1960's a UBC graduate student, Koozma Tarasoff, became interested in the Doukhobors. This resulted in the library becoming more involved in seeking out material for its collections.

Maria Horvath, then Senior Library Assistant in the Humanities Division, produced a series of three bibliographies in the early 1970's. Since 1974, Jack McIntosh, a UBC librarian and part time Slavic bibliographer, became involved and made a study trip to Moscow and St. Petersburg. The collection has grown steadily and is one of the largest in the world on this subject.

The Howay-Reid Collection

The private libraries of British Columbia Judge Frederic William Howay (1867-1943) and Dr. Robie Lewis Reid (1866-1945) formed the nucleus of Rare Books and Special Collections when they were donated in 1943 and 1945, respectively. Howay and Reid studied law at Dalhousie University. Both graduated in 1890, and in 1893 they formed the law firm of Howay & Reid in New Westminster. The partnership lasted until 1906 when Howay became a Judge.

F.W. Howay was a student of history more than a collector of books. He sought out books to challenge and further his knowledge of the events that interested him. Of special interest was the Maritime Fur Trade, a subject on which he became an international authority. He was known to write notes and changes directly onto the pages of his texts. Howay assembled a working library, through which he became an

authority on every subject that he studied. The collection totaled about 3,500 books and a number of maps and photographs as well as manuscripts.

When the plans for UBC were developed in the early 1900's, Dr. Reid determined the focus that would shape his collection practices for the rest of his career. He understood that the new university would likely be forced to focus on books of general interest and immediate need, so he assembled a collection of Canadian history and literature, and books by Canadian authors to present to the university. Dr. Reid was a pure collector, whose eye was not limited to books; he was also an accomplished numismatist. At the time of its donation to the University, Dr. Reid's collection included over 9,000 books, over 4,000 pamphlets, and a collection of other media, including maps, photographs and correspondence.

Thomas Murray Collection

In the summer of 1958 the University of British Columbia Library purchased a collection which would greatly advance its Canadian historical holdings. The acquisition provided the Library with enough new material to be able to claim a well-rounded Canadiana collection. Its collections had previously focused on Western Canadiana.

The Thomas Murray Collection consists of over 5,000 items of Canadiana with an emphasis on pre-Confederation Canadian history, primarily that of Upper and Lower Canada. The collection includes a variety of pamphlets relating to the North-West Rebellions and travel in Canada, as well as eleven volumes containing about 2,000 Canadian bookplates, collected and assembled by Murray. Also here is a collection of about 2,000 nineteenth and early twentieth century textbooks that make up the majority of

the textbook holdings in Rare Books and Special Collections. The collection has many of the chief landmarks of Canadian history and publishing.

Thomas Murray was born in Toronto in 1878 and died in Montreal on October 5, 1955. Apprenticed as a tailor as early as 1890, he moved to Montreal around the turn of the century. He operated his own manufacturing business from 1918 to 1928, amassing a small fortune that permitted him to retire at the age of fifty and to devote the rest of his life to his first love: books. Upon closing his garment business he established the Bleury Book Store, and later opened another branch on St. Catherine Street. His personal collection continued to grow throughout his lifetime, even after he closed his bookstores in 1949. It is unlikely that anyone knew the extent or nature of his own collection until after his death. At that time it was discovered that in addition to the large collection at his home, books were stored in several warehouses around Montreal.

A.J.T. Taylor Collection

About the same time as the Howay and Reid bequests, Mrs. Alfred James Towle Taylor presented the Library with her husband's Arctic collection, much of which had been assembled with the help of his friend, the Arctic explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson. Taylor, a native of Victoria, was born in 1887 and died in 1945. He was a prominent engineer in British Columbia involved in building the Lion's Gate Bridge, the British Properties, and the Capilano Estates. During World War II he was an advisor to the British Ministry of Production in London and New York, and for ten years was responsible for the Guinness interests in British Columbia.

The collection contains material on the discovery and exploration of the Arctic regions, the exploration of the Northwest Passage and the search for Franklin. Many first editions of the major voyages to the Arctic and the searches for a Northwest Passage are present. Maps of the Arctic region are included. The chronological emphasis is on eighteenth and nineteenth century voyages. Current publications on early Arctic discovery and exploration are collected, but not current scientific and technical writing.

Malcolm Lowry Collection

Malcolm Lowry (1909–57), was born in New Brighton, England, and went to school and university in Cambridge. He travelled widely in Europe and the US, settling in Mexico. He was a chronic alcoholic, as are many of the characters in his writings. He is most famous for the novel *Under the Volcano* (London, 1947), but he left many poems.

The collection includes works by Malcolm Lowry (1909-1957) in various editions and translations; all first editions are present. Also included are critical and biographical works; these written at this and other universities; and anthologies and critical works with some Lowry content. Books from Lowry's own library form part of the collection. The chronological emphasis is from the 1930's to the present. This collection is an adjunct to the library's extensive Lowry manuscript collection.

A.M. Pound Collection

Alfred Myrick Pound (1869-1932) was interested in British Columbia literature, and was a member of the Canadian Authors' Association, the Vancouver Poetry Society, and the Vagabond Club. He occasionally wrote articles, usually biographies, for newspapers and magazines. His library held one of the best private collections in Canada, and was especially rich in the works of his friends Bliss Carman and Sir Charles G. D. Roberts. Other authors included are Annie Charlotte Dalton, Isabel Ecclestone MacKay, Robert Allison Hood as well as other Vancouver writers. The collection includes books and pamphlets of Canadian fiction, essays and poetry, many of them autographed. His three daughters gave the Pound collection to UBC Library in October 1945.

Ethel Wilson Collection

Ethel Wilson was born in 1888 at Port Elizabeth, South Africa. At the age of ten she joined her grandmother in Vancouver, Canada, where she received her education and obtained a teacher's certificate in 1907; she taught until 1920 at several Vancouver public schools. She wrote her first novel, *Hetty Dorval*, in 1947. Other notable works include *Mrs. Golightly and Other Stories*, *The Innocent Traveller*, *The Equations of Love*, *Swamp Angel*, and *Love and Salt Water*. In 1961, in recognition of her contribution to Canadian literature, she was awarded a special medal by the Canada Council. She was later also distinguished as an Officer of the Order of Canada.

Rare Books and Special Collections has a small collection of the works of Ethel Wilson (1888-1980), with a complementary collection of works about her. This collection complements the Ethel Wilson manuscript collection.

Norman Colbeck Collection

Norman Colbeck was a bookseller who traded from Bournemouth on the south coast of England. Colbeck emigrated to Canada in 1967 where, at UBC Library, he prepared a two-volume catalogue of his collection.

"The Colbeck Collection consists of nearly 500 author collections, 465 of which are listed in the catalogue, concentrating on the poets and essayists of the Romantic, Victorian and Edwardian periods." The collection is strong in minor writers of the period and Anglo-Irish writers. Unique items include many rare first editions, special editions, limited editions, association and presentation copies, items of significance in the history of printing (by Lee, Priory, Pickering, Kelmscott, and Cuala presses), and publications of the book collectors' club Sette of Odd Volumes.

A.M. Donaldson Burns Collection

Alexander Mitchell Donaldson (1909-1961) was born in Glasgow Scotland, in 1891, and emigrated to Canada around 1909. He worked as a travelling auditor for the Ford Motor Company and later for Southern Motors of Vancouver. In the 1930's Donaldson began collecting books by and about Robert Burns (1759-1796) and Scotland. The collection was acquired in 1962 by the Friends of UBC Library to honour President N.A.M. MacKenzie who retired that year. The collection includes nearly all of the editions of Burns' works, as well as critical and biographical materials, Scottish song books, works by other Scottish writers, and works about favourite "haunts" of Burns. Also included are Donaldson's correspondence and papers.

H. Rocke Robertson Collection of Dictionaries and Related Works

Harold Rocke Robertson, born in Victoria in 1912, returned to British Columbia after WWI and became UBC's first Professor of Surgery, 1950-1959, and acting Dean of Medicine. In 1959 he went to Montreal to be Chief of Surgery at Montreal General Hospital and Chairman of McGill Medical Faculty's Department of Surgery. He served as Principal of McGill from 1962 to 1970.

The collection includes over 350 dictionaries and encyclopaedias. "There are to be seen in this collection many of the bands in the historical spectrum of the English dictionary. This spectrum extends from the first stirrings of the precursors in the Classical period and the Renaissance, through the earliest adventures in bilingual lexicography in the sixteenth century, to the comparatively small English dictionaries of the seventeenth century, past the surges of Bailey and Johnson in the eighteenth century, and finally to the great dictionaries of the twentieth century, of which the Oxford English Dictionary is the most outstanding."

‘Alice 100’ Collection

The collection of books covers every aspect of the nineteenth century writing for children under the nom de plume “Lewis Carroll” by the Rev. Charles Lutwidge Dodgson. It was collected by Robert Dennis Hilton Smith (1903-1974), a Victoria bookseller, and accompanied by his catalogue of the collection. This collection of books, pamphlets, leaflets and recordings, dating from 1858-1965, was purchased for the UBC Library by the graduating class of 1925, led by Stan Arkley. The collection is rich in first, early and limited editions and includes 200 editions of *Alice in Wonderland* and *Through the Looking Glass*, about half of which have illustrations by Sir John Tenniel. The other half has illustrations by some 80 other artists. The collection also includes parodies and imitations of Carroll’s works, some 50 editions of other books by Carroll, some 60 books about Carroll, 25 musical and dramatic versions, films and recordings, 15 collections and selections, and 20 miscellaneous pieces.

Arkley Collection of Early & Historical Children's Literature

Stan Arkley, a native of Vancouver and a UBC graduate, was the western representative of the American publisher, Doubleday. His wife Rose was a well-known primary school teacher in Seattle. Both were passionate about books, and built a collection of books enjoyed by children. In 1976 they donated their collection of over 3,000 books, chiefly American and British, to UBC, with the hope that their donation would encourage others to do likewise.

This collection contains Canadian, British and American children's books from the late eighteenth century to 1939. It is particularly strong in material by and about Lewis Carroll. Some unique items include Canadian first editions, early editions of children's classics, and works of important illustrators.

With the exception of the works of significant contemporary British Columbian and Canadian writers, works published after 1939 and journals are excluded from the collection.

Historical Textbook Collection

George Beans Collection of Japanese Maps of the Tokugawa Period

The University of British Columbia Library acquired the Beans Collection of Japanese maps in 1965 from the original collector, George Harry Beans (1894-1964?) of the Philadelphia Seed Company. Since then, the library has added to the collection, most notably with the 1986 acquisition of the George Bonn collection of 59 maps, 15 of which are manuscript maps.

Beans collected his maps over a number of years, and had a catalogue, extending to three supplements, published under his own Tall Tree Library imprint. *A List of Japanese Maps of the Tokugawa Era*¹ appeared in 1951, followed by the three supplements, A, B and C, between 1955 and 1963. The transfer of Beans' collection from Pennsylvania to Vancouver was announced in the international journal for the history of cartography, *Imago Mundi*², stating that "it is the [University's] intention to continue to develop it along the lines originally set out" by Mr. Beans in the introduction to his *List*.

The Beans Collection is the largest collection of maps and guidebooks of the Tokugawa period (circa. 1600-1867) outside of Japan, and one of the largest in the world. A number of items are rare, and some are unique. There are over 1100 entries for the Japanese maps in the Library's catalogue, including maps in atlases and other books in the Beans Collection. Unlike most of the collections outside Japan, this collection does not contain many government or administrative maps. Its focus is on privately published and travel-related maps and guides published in Japan during the Tokugawa period. There is world coverage, although the majority of maps are of the whole or parts of Japan. A number of prominent Japanese *ukiyo-e* artists are represented, among whom are Hishikawa Moronobu, Miyagawa Chôshun, Shiba Kôkan, Kuwagata Keisai (Shôshin), Katsushika Hokusai, Ando Hiroshige and Hashimoto Sadahide. There are also about 13 maps by Sadahide. Most of the maps by artists are travel-related.

Excluded from the collection are non-Japanese and post-1867 Japanese maps. Maps of Japan in European languages are in the Historical Map Collection. Present acquisition plans are to acquire original maps of the period not already in the collection, and significant material published in facsimile, as well as reference material in any language relating to early Japanese cartography.

The Howay-Reid Collection of Historical Maps

The map collection, which began in 1931 when the Valedictory Class of Arts donated a large collection of books, manuscripts, newspapers, photographs and maps relating to Pacific Northwest history, was greatly enlarged by the bequests of F. W. Howay in 1943, and Dr. Robie L. Reid in 1945.

Both men were interested in the voyages, and had copies of the published journals of Cook, Vancouver, Mackenzie and others. Howay had a fine copy of Jose Espinosa y Tello's *Relacion del viage hecho por las goletas Sutil y Mexicana en el ano de 1792* and its accompanying *Atlas para el viage...* (Madrid, 1802). Reid had Duflot de Mofras' *Exploration du territoire de l'Oregon, des Californies et de la Mer Vermeille* (Paris, 1844) with its accompanying atlas in his library. The publication of Cook's *Voyages* brought the North West Coast to the attention of the world, and later explorers and cartographers used his charts. Vancouver's voyage established Britain's claim to the North West Coast, and his charts, which combined the results of surveys by the Spaniards with his own, remained the most detailed maps of the coast for many years. Espinosa's *Atlas* was the first Spanish publication of charts of the North West Coast. Duflot de Mofras' *Atlas* includes one of the first maps to depict the geography of the area between the coast and the Rockies.

Judge Howay was a founding member of the Historic Sites Board of Canada and the British Columbia Historical Association, and was the first to write on many British Columbia historical topics. His collection is particularly rich in books, manuscripts, maps, and photographs relating to the history of pre-Confederation Canada and the Pacific Northwest, including the voyages of exploration and the fur trade. If there was no English translation of works he wanted to read, he had one made. In this way, he acquired a sizeable collection including maps, in original or copy form, of Western Canada and the Pacific Northwest. Howay's friend, Reid, was a lawyer and historian, and a founding member of the BC Historical Association. He was also instrumental in launching the *British Columbia Historical Quarterly*.

The wide range of maps in Howay's collection includes Delisle's maps showing the mythical geography of de Fonte, British Admiralty charts, Spanish voyages of exploration, and blueprints of the site of an

Hudson's Bay fort. Also present are photocopies of the manuscript maps in the British Columbia Department of Legal Surveys, as well as promotional maps for new British Columbia "cities."

The Rogers-Tucker Map Collection

In 1961 funds were donated in memory of a former faculty member, Dr. Gilbert Norman Tucker (1898-1955), to set up a collection of historical maps, with emphasis on French Canada and the Pacific. Dr. Tucker, a native of Vancouver, was a professor of Canadian history at UBC from 1948 until his death. He helped the University Library to develop the best collection of history and literature of French Canada west of Montreal, and he was working on a critical study of the historians of French Canada when he died. His widow, Frances Tucker, became interested in the project to establish an historical cartography collection, and her sister, Mrs. E. T. Rogers, Sr., provided the initial funds and some later donations. This provided an opportunity to begin the development of a more general collection of historical cartography, with emphasis on North America.

With the advice of Professors Coolie Verner and A. L. Farley, Basil Stuart-Stubbs, then head of Special Collections, was able to develop a representative collection of the work of many important cartographers prior to 1850. Mapmakers such as Ortelius, Mercator, Jansson, Jaillot, Robert de Vaugondy, Delisle, Bellin, Jefferys, Faden and the Arrowsmiths are included. Dr. Farley, a professor of Geography, wrote his

doctoral dissertation on the historical cartography of British Columbia, and published two atlases on the province.

As most of the important early published atlases were beyond our means, a policy was established to acquire as many facsimile atlases, maps, and historical cartography literature as possible. All the atlases published by Theatrum Orbis Terrarum, and much of the literature reprinted by Meridian Press, were acquired. We also obtained all the facsimile maps we could find. Coolie Verner added a number of interesting items over the years, culminating with the bequest of his library, map collection and papers in 1979.

Dr. Miguel P. and Julia G. Tecson Collection

Dr. Miguel P. Tecson, a descendant of a prominent Philippine family, practises psychiatry in Vancouver. Mrs. Julia G. Tecson, a serious balletomane and archivist, has compiled an extensive multimedia library on dance. She taught dance history in a ballet academy. Their first study collection of indigenous pottery, trade ceramics and ethnographic materials from the Philippines was donated in 1998 to the UBC Museum of Anthropology. Added in 1997 was a selected library on South-East Asian ceramics. A small fine collection of antique maps and prints of the Philippines was donated in 1997 to the UBC Library.

Coolie Verner Map Collection

Dr. Coolie Verner (1917-1979) was a professor of adult education at UBC, but his avocation was the history of cartography and cartobibliography. He developed a large collection of maps to support his study of the cartographic development of northern North America. His collection of Arctic maps was sold to the National Archives of Canada a few years before his death. On his death, his map collection, related books, and papers were left to the UBC Library. The will stipulated everything else be sold to provide funds for the Adult Education Reading Room, and an endowment for the Library's Historical Map Collection.

The maps in this collection are mainly of North America, in particular the western and northern parts, and of eastern Russia and China, and cover the period from the 16th - 20th century. There are groups of maps featuring the explorations of Cook, Vancouver, La Perouse, Müller, Cluny, De Fonte, Dixon and Meares, Mackenzie and Hearne. His map collection, consisting of some 400 maps, including originals and some photocopies, was used in research for the Glenbow-Alberta Institute exhibition³ on the opening of the Canadian West.

Some of the maps in his collection were used to illustrate *The Northpart of America* (Toronto: Academic Press, 1979), which he compiled with Basil Stuart Stubbs. In addition to the original maps, the Verner Collection includes photographs, photocopies and proofs of maps used in the book, research notes and photographs used in his other cartographic publications, a collection of title pages, his manual for cartobibliography, and his card file for the map collection.

Dr. Harry Colin Slim is a UBC graduate and Professor of Music at the University of California Irvine who donated his collection of 123 Stravinsky items to UBC Library in 1999. The collection includes a thoroughly annotated catalogue prepared by Dr. Slim, in the form a book that provides a detailed context for each item. Dr. William C. Gibson Collection in the History of Medicine and Science

Dr. William Carleton Gibson (1913-) joined the Faculty of Medicine at UBC in 1950 as a clinical researcher and associate professor. He was instrumental in the opening of the medical school after which he became Director of the Kinsman Laboratory for Neurological Research. From 1960 to 1978 he served as Professor and Head of the History of Medicine and Science Department. During that time he spearheaded the building of the Woodward Biomedical Library and was particularly involved in the purchases of antiquarian books for the Charles Woodward Memorial Room. The personal collections of Chauncey Leake, a US pharmacologist, Hugh M. Sinclair, an Oxford lecturer and researcher, and Sir Robert MacIntosh, an Oxford professor of anaesthesiology, were among the purchases that comprise the core of the collection.

Harry Hawthorn Collection

Harry Bertram Hawthorn (1910-) is a native of New Zealand, an anthropologist, and was the Head of the Department of Anthropology and Sociology at UBC from 1956 to 1968. This collection of books on angling and game fishing began and continues thanks to the support of the *Harry Hawthorn Foundation for the Incultation and Propagation of the Principles and Ethics of Fly-Fishing*. It includes a number of editions of Izaak Walton's *The compleat angler, or The contemplative man's recreation* and many more landmarks in the evolution of angling literature, as well as current publications on the topic. An annotated bibliography of the collection was first published in 1970; three supplements followed. In 1984 and 2002 computer generated listings were produced. The most significant holdings are in the Haig-Brown cabinet of the Sherrington Room in Woodward Library.

Gerald W. Korn Collection

Dr Gerald W. Korn practised obstetrics and gynecology in Vancouver and taught as a clinical professor at UBC from 1973 to 1990. Over the years he amassed a fine collection of early obstetrics and midwifery books, including works by E. Roesslin, F. Mauriceau, William Smellie, and J.Y. Simpson. Several large anatomical atlases are part of the collection. In 1997 he donated his collection to the UBC Library. Dr Korn insisted that the collection be kept together and he funded the construction of a cabinet and desk for this purpose.

Puban Collection

The Puban Collection, formerly owned by Yao Junshi of Macao was acquired by UBC for its Asian Library in 1959 with funds from the Friends of the Library and Dr. Walter Koerner. The collection holds about 3,200 Chinese language titles in about 45,000 volumes with oriental bindings, the majority from the Nanzhou studio in Guangdong Province. The collection is rich in classical philology with 250 titles on literary exposition, phonology, and etymology. Historical works include local histories with all 56 district gazetteers of Guangdong Province and records concerning 50 famous mountains throughout China. There are also works on the arts, archaeology, inked rubbings, and seal impressions. There are 27 multi-volume encyclopedias including one 205 volume set of a Song work in manuscript. There are also over 1,500 titles of literature with many fine prints and multi-colour editions from the Ming and Qing periods printed in two to seven colours. There are 50 works by the Tang poet Tu Fu and 800 titles by Qing authors.
